<u>The continued existence of</u> a free and democratic <u>society depends upon recognition</u> of the concept that <u>justice</u> <u>is based upon the rule of law grounded in respect for the dignity of the individual and his capacity</u> through reason <u>for enlightened self-government</u>.

<u>Law so grounded makes justice possible</u>, for <u>only through such law does</u> the dignity of <u>the individual attain respect and protection</u>.

<u>Without it</u>, individual rights become subject to unrestrained power, respect for law is destroyed, and <u>rational self-government</u> is <u>impossible</u>.

Lawyers, as guardians of the law, play a vital role in the preservation of society.

The fulfillment of <u>this role requires</u> an <u>understanding</u> by lawyers <u>of their</u> relationship with and <u>function in our legal system</u>. <u>A consequent obligation</u> of lawyers <u>is to maintain the highest standards</u> of ethical conduct.

In fulfilling his professional responsibilities, a lawyer necessarily assumes various roles that require the performance of many difficult tasks.

Not every situation which he may encounter <u>can be foreseen</u>, <u>but fundamental ethical principles are always present to guide him</u>.

With in the frame work of these principles, a lawyer <u>must</u> with courage and foresight <u>beable and ready to shape the body of the law to the ever-changing relationships of society</u>.

<u>The Model Code</u> of Professional Responsibility <u>points the way</u> to the aspiring <u>and provides</u> <u>standards by which to judge</u> the transgressor.

<u>Each lawyer must find within his own conscience the touchstone against which to test</u> the <u>extent to which his actions should rise above minimum standards</u>.

But in the last analysis it is <u>the desire for the respect and confidence</u> of the members of his profession and <u>of the society which he serves</u> that <u>should provide</u> to a lawyer <u>the incentive for the highest possible</u> degree of <u>ethical conduct</u>.

The possible loss of that respect and confidence is the ultimate sanction.

So <u>long as its practitioners are guided by these principles</u>, <u>the law will continue to be a noble profession</u>.

This is its greatness and its strength, which permit of no compromise.
