The Legislative Assembly hereby declares, that, as a matter of statewide concern, <u>it is in the best interests of the people</u> of this state, <u>that</u>, <u>the judicial branch</u> <u>of</u> state <u>government</u>, including the appellate, tax and circuit courts, <u>be funded and</u> <u>operated at</u>, <u>the state level</u>.

<u>The Legislative Assembly finds</u> that <u>state funding and operation</u> of the judicial branch <u>can provide for best statewide allocation of governmental</u> <u>resources</u>, <u>according to the actual needs of the people</u>, and of the judicial branch, <u>by establishing an accountable</u>, equitably funded, <u>and uniformly administered</u> <u>system of justice</u>, for all the people of this state.

(1) The <u>Supreme Court is the highest</u> judicial <u>tribunal of the judicial</u> <u>department of government in this state</u>. The <u>Chief Justice</u> of the Supreme Court <u>is</u> <u>the presiding judge</u> of the court <u>and</u> the <u>administrative head of</u> the <u>judicial</u> <u>department of government in this state</u>. The <u>Chief Justice shall exercise</u> administrative authority and <u>supervision over the courts</u> of this state <u>consistent</u> <u>with applicable provisions of law</u> and the Oregon Rules of Civil Procedure. ...
